A Message from the Artistic Director

This production of *Graduation Ball* is unlike any ever seen before. Ages ago, I was in a production of *Grad Ball* and loved the beautiful couples waltzing together and the spectacular partnering. But that was then, and this is now. This time, we closely followed all Covid precautions through it all. However, as creative people, we took the original storyline as inspiration and made needed changes, without sacrificing the original exuberant sensibility.

In March 2020 we were a scant three weeks away from our full-length *Alice in Wonderland* taking the stage. And then, all our lives were changed. Performances were cancelled and our entire building was shuttered. For the first time in 40⁺ years, there was no Metro Dancers full-length ballet that season.

Despite hopes for a quick resolution to the pandemic, it is still very much with us a full year later. Happily, we were able to resume limited classes, under strict CDC guidelines, and adjusted and re-invented the way we do nearly everything. The biggest change has been switching to producing virtual performances. Once we made it through a virtual *Dance Mosaic* last Fall, a decision had to be made about what to do for our story ballet this Spring.

Credit to Miss Virgie for suggesting *Grad Ball* to me, which requires a limited cast that can be rehearsed in small groups. It also afforded an opportunity for all our current Metro Dancers company to shine, create new characters and master new choreography. Thanks to Miss Diane for pulling a rabbit out of the hat with the wonderful all-new costumes. Also, my special thanks to the Mills family for donating their design and construction of the lovely chandeliers that grace the stage. They also have added a touch of elegance to our daily classes.

Please enjoy our unique production of *Graduation Ball*. We like it so much, we are planning to keep it this way, as a reminder of how it brought us joy in the midst of a pandemic. We hope it brings you joy as well. But next time, maybe, we can safely do without the masks.

Graduation Ball 2021

The Story of Graduation Ball

During the 1840's, the Headmistress of a fashionable Viennese girls finishing school, has invited the cadets of the city's military academy to attend a ball, celebrating the graduation of the senior class. The senior and junior girls, long anticipating this event, are greatly excited by the pending arrival of the cadets. Flirtations, exuberant dances, and a secret romance ensue.

The History of Graduation Ball

Graduation Ball was a collaboration between David Lichine and Antal Doráti. This one act ballet was choreographed by Lichine to music composed by Johann Strauss II and arranged by Dorati. The scenario devised by Lichine featured scenery and costumes designed by Alexandre Benois. It was first presented by the *Original Ballet Russe* at the Theatre Royal, Sydney, Australia, on March 1, 1940,

It was reported that the premiere performance of *Graduation Ball* received twenty-five curtain calls. It was an immediate success. During the Sydney engagement and on the subsequent Australian tour, it was performed more than sixty times. It was first presented in the United States by the *Original Ballet Russe* in New York City. *Graduation Ball* became a signature work of the *Original Ballet Russe* and was performed countless times. Over the years it has been danced by many professional and regional companies around the world,

Synopsis

The Invitation

The curtain opens to reveal a formal ballroom. Soon, groups of Grammar School, Junior and Senior Girls enter and begin excitedly preparing for the ball. The Headmistress comes to make sure that all is in order. A messenger delivers a box of chocolates, sent by the General, which the Grammar School girls raid once the Headmistress departs. The Drummer announces the arrival of the General, leading a cadre of cadets.

Breaking the Ice

At first the cadets and the girls are timid, standing apart. The Pigtail Girl decides to break the ice and walks directly to speak to the cadets. When her efforts fail, she does a rather bold dance in which she encourages a cadet to join her. Such familiarity is promptly disrupted by the General. Once order is returned, the Headmistress and General encourage a more formal mode of dance and leave to check on the dining room.

The Grand Waltz

After a mishandled attempt by a Junior cadet to ask a girl to dance with him, a senior cadet steps in and gets the evening going with a Grand March to select dance partners for the Waltz. The young people soon begin to dance joyfully with each other.

A Shy Couple

Following the Grand Waltz, a shy couple's nervous attempts at conversation gradually turn into the safety of a dance. By the end of the dance their connection has eased, and they step aside to converse.

The Rivals

Two girls become Rivals over the attentions of one of the cadets. In their attempt to out-do one another with the brilliance of their dance talents, they become so self-absorbed that neither notices that the cadet has gone.

The Good Girls and the Note

Not to be outdone, two teacher's pets show off their dance skills in an effort to impress everyone. A messenger brings in a note for one of the girls. Seeing the reaction of the girl, the Headmistress snatches the note from the girl's hand and reads it. With shock at the intimate nature of the note she shares it with the General. The General immediately confronts the cadet who sent it, as the Headmistress takes charge of the girl. Both are marched out of the room followed by the irate adults.

The Gossips and Hear No, See No, Speak No Evil

The other Good Girl cannot wait to share the content of the note with the other girls and cadets. A frenzy of tattle tales swirl around the room until interrupted by the junior girls. The junior girls admonish their classmates that such behavior is inappropriate. Amidst the calm created by the junior girls the Headmistress and General return with the miscreants. And then the Headmistress sends her students and the cadets off stage, to have dinner.

A Secret Romance?

While the students are gone, the Headmistress and the General rekindle their past warm relationship by dancing a lively a mazurka, which reveals their attraction. Following their dance, the young people enter and are delighted to find the normally staid couple joyfully kicking up their heels. Everyone dances a high-spirited galop, bringing the evening to a grand finale.

A Sad Farewell

The ball sadly comes to a close. As the cadets march out the girls tearfully wave goodbye and are sent back to their rooms by the Headmistress. After the ballroom has emptied, four shadowy figures find their way into the ballroom. The shy couple have made plans to sneak back in to see each other again. However, the General and the Headmistress have also re-entered to see each other. But, both assignations are spoiled when the young couple and the adults bump into each other. Thereupon, the Cadet is led out by the General and the Girl is marched off stage. The curtain closes.
